In this issue we discussed some queer words in Chinese languages being banned and censored on the internet. *Fill in the Blanks: Queer Print Culture in Hong Kong* is a research project started in the summer 2022 as a one-month incubator residency at WMA space in Hong Kong that started to look into the queer history of Hong Kong through the introduction of various independently published printed matters in different eras.

Every conversation is an invitation to explore an alternative hypothetical version of reality, to experience things in a new way, to imagine a different version of yourself and of each other. We like to think of this book as a game: 1. Find a partner and / or a moment. 2. Pick a question or choose randomly. 3. Ask the question. 4. Think of an answer and listen to the response. 5. Propose variations (what if...). 6. Let the alternative realities unfold. 7. What are the reasons behind the particular answers given? 8. Could the hypothesis become real and how? 9. Change roles. 10. Take the time to think and to be silent. 11. Take the time to not think and to imagine. 12. Let the discussion unfold. 13. Follow the threads and let go. 14. Find another question. 15. Reiterate.

Navigation Beyond Vision
Doreen Mende (Harun Farocki Institute), Tom Holert (Harun Farocki Institute), Brian Kuan Wood (e-flux)

Navigation begins where the map becomes indecipherable. Only a few weeks prior to his untimely death in 2014, Harun Farocki briefly referred to navigation as a contemporary challenge to montage—editing distinct sections of film into a continuous sequence—as the dominant paradigm of techno-political visibility. For Farocki, the computer-animated, navigable images that constitute the twenty-first century’s “ruling class of images” call for new tools of analysis, prompting him to ask: How does the shift from montage to navigation alter the way images—and art—operate as models of political action and modes of political intervention?

We Make Books! Independent Publishing in Africa

Khatt Books and Sharjah Art Foundation will each present their bookmaking process, and explore cultural production through independent publishing from and about the Arab World. Their presentations will highlight the context within which they operate and the critical frameworks and subject matter they engage with. They will present a historical overview of innovative and hybrid publishing platforms from the region.

They include information on research methods, funding strategies, production techniques and distribution approaches, all underpinned by the perspectives and advice of experienced publishers.

Artists' Survival Kit (NERO)

Beneath the glamorous surface of the art world—the openings and dinner parties, the record-breaking auction prices, the media attention—lies a reality that is precarious, complex, and very often existential: only a tiny minority of artists support themselves with their work and fewer still manage to do so throughout their lives. This book tells those other stories, for example of artistic practices grounded in performance, research, and political activism. These practices are not necessarily oriented toward producing marketable objects.
